

A MESSAGE FROM THE VENERABLE MASTER

am proud, honored, and humbled to be elected to serve you, my Brethren, and our Valley of Oakland as the 2023 Venerable master. God has blessed all of us during the past few years! I will do my best to serve until the time comes to pass this honor.

Our ancient brethren gave us a successful blueprint for the ongoing project of building the Masonic fraternity. They selected and hewed the stones from their spiritual quarries and laid them well with mortar. They were square, level, and plumb. They informed us that we should only accept the proper materials within the temple to practice and teach our moral science. That we should embrace the laws of nature by working with, not against, our creator and to emulate divine wisdom. We are to make good men great, not evil men good.

One of our functions is to be a bright and shining beacon for the lost so they may find refuge and safety. We are not a group of mediocre men who struggle to scrape what is needed to build a relatively well-kept storehouse of cots and soup pots to feed the self-destructive and dysfunctional. Instead, we are a guide to societies worldwide, hopeful that by following our example, they will be

more instructive, charitable, and forgiving.

In our temple, we have much to do. Our working tools must be used, lest they become rusted and pitted. A stonemason's tool should be used gently, just as our moral tools should be. If the oaths, laws, tenets, cardinal virtues, forms, and supports were well-followed, our need for new bylaws would be negated. Frustrations, offenses, and fears uncorrected will inevitably result in future trials, although it may not entirely be the offender's fault.

We were instructed in the Master Mason's degree that we should follow the five points of fellowship. Too often, we turn a blind eye to poor conduct and a deaf ear to offensive speech. However, as true masters of the noble Craft, we should inform the erring Brother of their offenses and aid in his reformation, remembering him in our devotion to Deity, and keeping his secrets as our own. Until we begin building as Master Masons, we may never erect the cathedral on earth or heaven. So, how important is it that we only accept the best materials for the temple?

From my perspective, it is hard enough to keep vice, gossip, and all other destructive influences away from good men, not to mention how nearly impossible it would be to do the same for those addicted to errant habits. Yes, I believe it is a sad truth that just as a man can be bonded to his

brothers in fraternal love and goodness, so too can a man be so bonded to vice that his pores and veins may never become unclogged. During life, we change many times. We are born, grow into adolescence, manhood, old age, and finally, death. Unfortunately, some men only learn the importance of a well-lived life at the threshold of death. They gain wealth, status, and earthly pleasures, finally witnessing the truth of how all these will die with them. They may have had a loving wife, eager children, and hopeful parents. All these blessings may have gone unnoticed, but when the end is imminent, they are the only thing he sees.

Our future temple is not of this earth. Its perfect ashlars are raised to Heaven. They are of the best quality, so the building of our invisible temple was, is, and always will be made up of the very best materials available from the common stock of humanity. Therefore, we call on every true craftsman to endeavor to build the spiritual building in perfect harmony with his fellow brethren. As we complete each level of our temple, we should hold fast to the square, plum, and level and spread the mortar of brotherly love liberally with all our associates, family, community, and true self.


It is impossible to offer libations to companions without first having ample provisions for the self and not the ego, which starves the true self. Envious in its nature, it will jealously drain virtue from every being until, through frustration (or even starvation), it turns from its infatuation with a false reflection of the self and excavates the depths of the soul until the true self emerges. Or, it self-destructs through reckless or perverse usages of Masonic tools. Only the worthy, well-qualified, and properly vouched for may be admitted.

A brother's public and private life may be too intensive an inquiry to verify for many lodges. However, several lodges continue to carry the sacred torch. These bearers of light possess a deep obligation to bring the dross and inert back to life. At certain times the Craft has fallen victim to ruffians of every stripe. They have remained undiscovered in our midst, and even unknown to themselves due to self-ignorance.

In his essay, "Of Goodness and Goodness of Nature," Sir Francis Bacon wrote, "take goodness in this sense, the affecting of the weal of men, which is what the Grecians call philanthropia; and the word humanity, (as it is used) is a little too light to express it. Goodness, I call the habit, and goodness of nature, the inclination. This of all virtues, and dignities of the mind, is the greatest; being the character of the Deity: and without it, man is a busy, mischievous, wretched thing; no better than a kind of vermin. Goodness answers to the theological virtue, charity, and admits no excess, but error. The desire of power in excess caused the angels to fall; the desire of knowledge in excess, caused man to fall but in charity there is no excess; neither can angel, nor man, come in danger by it."

I look forward to input from all of our members as we face the new year's challenges. Everyone's contributions are significant as this is *our* valley.

Let us proceed forward, arm-in-arm, as builders and brothers. I wish you all a happy & blessed year!





OAKLAND SCOTTISH RITE HISTORICAL FOUNDATION

An Innovative Approach to Fraternal Culture and Preservation Adam Kendall, 32° KCCH, Executive Director

We are excited to announce that the Harry Yetter Masonic Research Library is now inventorying our archival and library collection using the web-based collections management software CatalogIt (https://www.catalogit.app). This means no more spreadsheets that are easily corrupted, hard to read, and generally not recommended for the long-term management of cultural collections. CatalogIt allows us to include an object's historical information, location, its photograph, dimentions, who last altered the record, and a host of other features.

At the time of this writing, we are migrating the data from our current records into the new database. Once this has been accomplished, we will be able to link this information to our Foundation's website (https://osrhistoricalfoundation.org), thus making our records available to our membership and general public. As you know, the inventory is ongoing, so new items will appear frequently.



CatalogIt allows us to catalog, catagorize, and attach the historical and physical data for each item. Above is an example of a typical record.

Highlighting the Historical Treasures of the Oakland Scottish Rite Temple Adam Kendall, 32° KCCH, Executive Director, Oakland Scottish Rite Historical Foundation

LOCAL HERITAGE


In 2022, we passed two significan milestones: the first was the ninety-seventh anniversary of the Oakland Scottish Rite Temple's groundbreaking ceremony on December 12, 1925. This was followed a few days later with the ninety-fifth anniversary of the opening of the Temple, whereby on December 5, 1927, the first stated meeting was conducted in the building. Seven days later, on December 12 (exactly one year after the groundbreaking), it was officially dedicated with much fanfare.

TRADITIONS OF WISDOM

Freemasonry is not monolithic, so what exists in one region may not in another. However, there are a few consistencies, such as the Hiramic legend. Another is the institution's penchant for evocative symbols from the distant past. Although there is no historical evidence of a *direct* lineage from the the multitude of wisdom traditions in the ancient world, they have undoubtedly elicited genuine inspiration from the fraternity's early practitioners, as seen in its rich artistic heritage. Suppose it can be assumed that Freemasonry teaches the best of humanity's quest for knowledge. In that case, it is entirely appropriate to produce artistic praises to those mythological patrons of sublime wisdom such as Hermes, or symbols of the Deity! Below are two jewels that fit this description.

Left: A lodge breast jewel representing the caduceus of Hermes, the Greek god of wisdom, alchemy, travel, and other mystical arts. It is surmounted with a disk and delta, and is interlaced with a square and compasses. Unfortunately, its provenance is difficult to determine: the only markings on the obverse are so faint they are challenging to read, and we only know from the inscription on the envelope from which it was discovered that it originated in Karlstad, Sweden and was a longtime possession of "Alfred E. Dillings's son-in-law's father...".

Right: A jewel consisting of a pair of interlaced triangles. This symbol is employed in various rites and degrees of Freemasonry, such as the Scottish Rite. In the center are two hands clasped in friendship with an as-yet unidentified object (perhaps flames) arising from the grip. It is inlaid with diamonds, with rubies at each point. On the reverse is an inscription indicating that the jewel was struck to commemorate the founding of the Valley of Constancia and Concordia, Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry in Peru. It is dated November 16, 1862.





POETIC LICENSE

Throughout the centuries, Masons have maintained near-sacred traditions of conviviality. We love to gather together for meals after a long (or short) session of ritual. We feast... we toast... we regale each other with tall tales and heroic Masonic deeds. Most of all, we love commenting on our food. So commonplace is this tradition amongst American Masons, that the jokes about tri-tip and green beans are nearly ubiquitous. We all know of a lodge (sometimes it's our own) that possesses a culinary custom that stokes some manner of critique or praise — either for its rare gastronomic ingenuity, or for its uninspired thriftyness. In former days, these observations and frustrations were influenced by that great Masonic lesson of rhetoric. Not content with merely celebrating or roasting their fellows, brethren following the same tradition of Bro. Robert Burns's "Address to the Haggis," would sometimes compose prose and poetry to their food-often with the stinging barbs of humor and sarcasm.

Consider the following poem composed by Taliesin Evans, a member of Oakland No. 188 (one our Valley's constituent lodges). The brethren were frustrated by the constant presence of doughnuts provided by a Valley founder, Charles E. Gillett, despite their objections and appeals from the Master, George C. Pardee (another founding member, an Oakland mayor, and a California governor). According to the lodge's 75th anniversary yearbook, Pardee and the others pleaded to an unmoved Gillett, who was "always falling back on the doughnut as necessary from a standpoint of economy." The book's author claimed that the tradition was abolished with the reading of Evans's witty poem, which is narrated by the sad old doughnut (who mentions in passing the Masonic temple on 14th Street and Broadway). Thank you to Bro. Tigran Agadzhanyan, 32°, for bringing this brilliant work to my attention.

A Doughnut's Lament by Taliesin Evans Dedicated to Oakland Lodge No. 188, F. & A. M. (1868–October 11–1893)

It is twenty-five years, or p'raps more, ago Since the hour when first I saw daylight, you know, In a dingy old cellar on lower Broadway— The town was in petticoats clothed, then, they say-My form was well rounded, my features were fair, And, O, I was feted and courted—well—everwhere! The "dad of the Lodge" was then handsome and young And whispered sweet things that never were sung, But, O, he was bashful, and so dreadfully shy-He'd fondle me, then drop me, and never say why! And after him came others in annual course— Each one in his turn making matters much worse, "Till now, my dear friends, I'm like Northey's white hat-I'm faded and jaded and old and all that.

The years have sped onward in rapid array And I have grown wrinkled and haggard and gray! My form is now shriveled, my features are hard-There's no one who'll touch me or say a kind word. I've been kicked and been cuffed and been tossed all around, I've been placed on the shelf and thrown on the ground, Until I'm at last forced to sing my lament, And say like the poet of old, "Let 'er went!" For twenty-five years have passed o'er me, you see, And now I'm dead as a doughnut can be; So what is the use to cry or to fret— I'll surrender the ghost without hindrance or let, Saying good-bye to you, brethren, and ta ta to Gillett.



TREASURES OF THE OAKLAND SCOTTISH RITE TO SHINE IN THE ACADEMIC SPOTLIGHT


On April 8, the Oakland Scottish Rite Historical Foundation's executive director, Adam Kendall, 32° KCCH, and several esteemed scholars such as Mark Dennis, Curator of the Museum of Freemasonry in London, Aimee Newel, Director of Collections and Exhibitions at the Museum of the American Rvolution, and public history expert and author, Leigh Ann Gardner, will convene at UCLA with hosts, Drs. Margaret Jacob and Susan Mitchell Sommers, for the Grand Lodge of F. & A.M. of California's 11th Annual International Conference on Freemasonry.

Titled, "From the Attic of the Grand Lodge," the conference "is an exploration of that vast collection of material culture—the technical term for all that 'stuff.' What should lodges do with it? How do we know what's valuable and what isn't? And how do these items, from bibles to regalia to aides de mémoire, help tell the larger story of Freemasonry? The academic study of material history and how it can deepen our understanding of historical events is an important part of the profession's most dynamic area of growth: public history."

Bro. Adam's presentation is titled "Listening to the Secret and Silent," and it will feature examples directly from our collection. The following is his topic summary:

The vexing problem for many professional and non-academic historians when confronted with Masonic artifacts, is how these often-overlooked sources might be examined and interpreted to break through the layers of hearsay, local legend, and the absence of provenance. How can they be used to reconstruct a historical record? Moreover, how can we translate that history, once recovered, into a useful narrative that will instruct and invigorate a genuine interest from the organization and the public? Drawing on examples found inside the 1927 Oakland Scottish Rite Temple, Kendall will demonstrate how the lessons of these forgotten treasures can assist the budding Masonic historian with their collection.

OAKLAND VALLEY EDUCATION PROGRAM

THE DEGREE REVIEW PROGRAM

Unless otherwise noted, the Degree Review Program meets in person following our stated meeting at 8:10 pm.

We have spent the last two quarters looking at the degrees in the Council of Kadosh. The spring quarter will continue that focus with the four degrees associated with the ancient mystery tradition. These degrees are considered philosophical for two reasons. First, they examine theological questions related to the ancient mystery tradition. Second, they present a more in-depth evaluation of the system of moral philosophy known as virtue ethics.

In January, we reviewed the 23rd degree, Chief of the Tabernacle, and began exploring the mystery traditions. This series of degrees gives the Scottish Rite its reputation for being an introduction into comparative religious studies.

The 23rd degree used Judaism as the vehicle to explore the ceremonies and ideas associated with the lesser mysteries, which were said to be initiatory ceremonies employed in ancient Egypt, Persia, Greece, and Rome. These were the religious mysteries open to all.

On February 6th, we will host guest lecturer Dr. Christopher McIntosh, who will present "Occult Russia: Pagan, Esoteric, and Mystical Traditions."

In March, we will cover the 24th degree, Prince

of the Tabernacle. This degree again uses early Judaism to explore concepts associated with the greater mysteries. The thrust of the degree is to understand the meaning and purpose of symbolic instruction through initiation. I guarantee if you attend this meeting, you will never again think of the four classical elements in the same way.

For our April session, we will review the 25th degree: Knight of the Brazen Serpent. The degree is also known as the Sufi Master degree, employing the teachings of Sufism, an esoteric approach of Islam. While it presents some of the basic tenets of Islam, it also takes a deeper look at the challenges that confront a man on the path of symbolic instruction. Through the conversation of mystics, we are reminded that the purpose of initiation is change. It is meant to be transformative.

THE CAPSTONE GUILD

The Capstone Guild will hold its fourth quarterly meeting on May 1 to discuss the 4th degree, Secret Master—the first and mandatory degree from the Lodge of Perfection.

The degree continues the Hiramic legend and introduces a brother to our Scottish Rite system, which includes the Kabbalah as a philosophical curriculum to assist in the contemplation on the nature of God.

At the May meeting, for the summer quarter study

topic the Guild will also select a degree from the Chapter Rose Croix.

The Capstone Guild is intended to be an in-depth examination of one of the higher degrees. As a group member, you study and compare the 1783 Franken Manuscript, the Magnus Opus of Albert Pike, and the actual Scottish Rite reunion degree scripts.

Please remember to return the signed-out degree scripts. I ask that these degree scripts not be duplicated in any way and that they be returned to me after the meeting that covers that particular degree. I am keeping track of attendance at the Guild meetings because after attending a certain number of sessions, a special jewel will be presented to qualifying members of the Capstone Guild.

While the Guild is a serious attempt to understand the history, purpose, and symbolism of the Scottish Rite degrees, you do not have to be a group member to attend the meetings. Everyone is invited to participate in the review discussion even if they have not formally signed up.








2023 INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS




