

#### A MESSAGE FROM THE WISE MASTER

Brethren, it is a great and humbling honor to serve as Wise Master of Gethsemane Chapter, Knights Rose Croix, and there is no more beautiful ceremony in our calendar than the old Maundy Thursday rite, reimagined in our current tradition to preserve and advance its most moving and intellectually stimulating elements. Under Illustrious Prestage's guidance, I've been studying the fascinating Ceremony of Remembrance and Renewal, and I wanted to share a few thoughts on this profound observance.

The solemn commemoration is rooted in the Last Supper and the simple yet revolutionary command: "Love one another." While our modern ceremony, held near the hopeful time of the vernal equinox, isn't a religious rite, it beautifully captures that essential spirit. As the texts explain, it is a time for remembrance—recalling not only the brethren we've lost this year but all those throughout history who suffered for seeking truth and fearlessly living on the square in the face of tyrannies that skewed justice.

Think of the powerful symbolism we witness! The Mystic Banquet, with its shared bread and wine, echoes ancient covenants like Passover but transforms them into a pledge of fraternity, innocence, and reconciliation. Each rekindled flame reaffirms liberty, equality, and fraternity—the eternal principles for which the martyrs died. ## OAKLAND VALLEY EDUCATION PROGRAM

#### THE DEGREE REVIEW PROGRAM

In June, we will review the next degree in the Lodge of Perfection—the 13th Degree, The Royal Arch of Solomon. We have already left the legend of Hiram behind us. The allegorical story still occurs during the construction of King Solomon's Temple, but the focus shifts to events outside the Temple. In this degree, King Solomon selects three men to explore the site of a pagan temple as the possible location for constructing a new justice administration building.

The degree introduces the legend of Enoch, the antediluvian patriarch, and his cube engraved with the name of God. The participants' journey takes the form of a vertical descent through nine arched vaults, where they make an astonishing discovery.

In July, we will review the 14th Degree, The Perfect Elu, which is the last in the Lodge of Perfection and the second of the five mandatory degrees that must be conferred in the Scottish Rite system. The Perfect Elu is also the final degree in the story of the First Temple, known as King Solomon's Temple.

The 14th continues the metaphor of hidden and arched stone chambers introduced in the preceeding degree. Except this time, the symbolic location is a vault under the Holy of Holies of King Solomon's Temple. The vault, which was the secret meeting place of the three Grand Masters of the Hiramic legend, was accessed by a series of horizontal chambers that went from the palace to the temple. This location became the depository for the cubical stone discovered in the 13th Degree.

This horizontal movement places the emphasis on the earthly dimension of our journey in contrast with the spiritual dimension associated with the vertical journey in the 13th Degree.

A new challenge is presented: How do we, as mortal men, access that spiritual element we identified in the 13th Degree?

In August, I will introduce The second body of the Scottish Rite system, The Chapter of Rose Croix. This will be a broad overview of the dominant themes presented in the 15th through the 18th degrees. These degrees are the spiritual core of the Scottish Rite. They give us a deeper understanding of the theological virtues associated with masonry.

These degrees also explore important philosophical themes. We look carefully at the exercise of free will,

the role of intellectual inquiry, and the concept of personal liberty. Myth, religion, and philosophy try to answer the big questions about origin, life, and death. The Chapter of Rose Croix uses all three of these methods to broaden our understanding of these profound spiritual questions.

Please join us in the Research Library after the stated meetings for these multimedia degree presentations and discussions.

#### THE CAPSTONE GUILD

The next meeting of the Capstone Guild will be in September. The Guild will delve into the 15th Degree, Knight of the East, at that meeting. After a brief degree summary, the meeting will focus on the historical evolution of the Fifteenth Degree.

The Capstone Guild is a more in-depth examination of one of the higher degrees. As a group member, you study and compare the 1783 Franken Manuscript, Albert Pike's *Magnum Opus*, and the Reunion Degree Script adopted by the Supreme Council and used by the Oakland degree teams.

Under our new format, brothers read excerpts from these recommended study materials. Afterward, the discussion focuses on these excerpts from the readings.

Members should join the Capstone Guild if they want to do the background reading and/or help lead the discussions. While the Guild is a serious attempt to understand the history, purpose, and symbolism of the degree, you do not have to be a member of the Capstone Guild to attend the meetings and participate in the discussions. Everyone is welcome to attend.

I keep track of attendance at the Guild meetings because after attending the required number of sessions, the Oakland Valley will present a special jewel to members of the Capstone Guild. I am planning for a special Capstone Guild jewel ceremony in 2026.

#### "TO EVERYTHING THERE IS A SEASON, AND A TIME TO EVERY PURPOSE...."1

Brethren,

This is my last official article for our bulletin, as I have resigned from my position at the Oakland Scottish Rite (I remain a volunteer director of the Oakland Scottish Rite Historical Foundation for the time being). It has been an honor to serve this Valley and to shine a light on its historical importance for our city, state, and nation. Every time I review the items in our various collections (Edwin Sherman and Walter Scaife, to name a few), I am in awe of the historically critical items we possess. It is a historian's dream and, surely, a Mason's pride to be the steward of such treasures. My departure does not mean I will no longer contribute to our Valley's programs. In fact, as my research progresses, you will likely see a few occasional contributions our bulletin, not to mention published articles and a few presentations.

Although I will not be at the temple daily, I will be working on a new paper featuring our Valley's prime mover, Edwin Sherman. A good portion of my research is derived from his wonderful collection, which is in our possession. I am also examining the archive of the inimitable Walter Scaife and planning research projects about his incredible contributions and fascinating life stories. I love our history and am excited that my work will bring more recognition to the Oakland Scottish Rite and its legacy. Our educational culture needs to be perpetuated and enjoyed, and I am proud that I have been able to access just a small sampling of what is hidden in our corridors. The question remains about how our objects and library will be preserved and maintained. The collection was created for our benefit and intellectual growth. As evidence of this, one only needs to walk into the library. That glorious room was always a home for books and was desired by the brethren so much that it was included in the original blueprints. It is our responsibility to understand and preserve this heritage.

We can be justifiably proud of our forebears' foresight, but we should always consider the future care of what we have inherited. To that end, the past three-plus years have seen the Oakland Scottish Rite Historical Foundation and my work in the library highlighting our Valley's important legacy has made a demonstrable impact; more people (Masons and non-members alike) are aware of our collection and are genuinely interested in us.

Our historical items require stability and order; no matter what, their care is a commitment that cannot be shirked. Naturally, I will remain in an advisory role so those future brethren tasked with their care can always reach out. Our purpose and time have never been so clear. *United, we stand!* 



# From the Harry G. Yetter Masonic Research Library & Museum

#### A TREASURE REVIVED!

One of our many treasures was recently repaired and given a protective home by way of generous donations from our own Bro. Howard Silsdorf, 32°, and Bro. Tyler Lyons, 32°, from the Valley of Los Angeles. The book, which is the 1784 "Noorthouck Edition" of James Anderson's seminal work, *Constitutions of the Free-Masons*, was suffering from some age-related damage, such as the spine separating from the cover. As the Oakland Scottish Rite Historical Foundation's inaugural book repair project, the widespread Masonic importance of this document made it a natual choice. The bookbinder painstakingly replaced the leather on the spine as the intention was to keep as much of the original as possible. He then stabilized some of the small abrasions and tears.

These donations also allowed us to purchase a custom-made oyster shell box to protect our investment for future generations.




